



1	Tiruttani SO	631209	30.05.2026	Tiruttani, Arulmigu Subramaniya Swamy Temple is the 5th abode of Lord Muruga. Lord Muruga in a great battle with Surabaduman his petty anger with the Vedars to marry Vallimalai was appeased, and the palce where he sat was hence named as Thanigai. This is the place where the fear of the Gods against asuras is alleviated.	
2	Tiruparankundram SO	625005	30.05.2026	Arulmigu Subramaniya Swamy Temple is a rock cut temple which is situated in the hillock of Tiruparankundram. This is considered to be the first among the six Arupadaiveedu of Lord Muruga. Lord Murugan married deity Deivanai in this place. Hence Tiruparankundram is considered as the most auspicious place for marriage. Lord Murugan graces in a sitting form after his divine wedding.	
3	Tiruchendur SO	628215	30.05.2026	Arulmigu Subramania Swamy Temple, Tiruchendur - 628215 is the only arupadaiveedu located at the seashore, while the rest of the temples are invariably located on high elevations as on hill tops. The line drawing depicting the seashore is emphasizing the unique aspect of the temple. This is considered to be the second among the six Arupadaiveedu of Lord Murugan.	
4	Swamimalai SO	612302	30.05.2026	Arulmigu Swaminatha Swamy Temple is one among the six abodes dedicated Lord Murugan. Located at Swamimalai that attract tourists and deities to the small town. Legend has that, this is the palce where Lord Murugar taught the meaning of Om Pranava Mantra to Lord Shiva.	
5	Alagarkovil SO	625301	30.05.2026	Arulmigu Murugan Temple, Solaimalai Mandapam, Alagarkovil - 625301 is considered to be the last among the six Arupadaiveedu of Lord Murugan,. Pazhamudhircholai Murugan Temple is deeply rooted in the legend where the great Tamil Poet Avvaiyar was tested by Lord Murugan under the Naaval tree.
